
Who are Hmong people?

- A people with no country.




How Did We Come to the U.S?





Hmong Story Cloth

- Story cloths were a way to document the stories one wanted to remember and share.
- Hmong story cloths were only invented in the 1970s, when thousands of Hmong were interred in refugee camps.
- Hmong women developed story cloths. Handsewn.
